Centennial Academy Welcomes John Franken at Remembrance Day Assembly

Centennial students and faculty paid tribute to Canada's veterans at a special assembly in honour of Remembrance Day. We were privileged to welcome John Franken, a member of the Dutch Navy Air Force and WWII survivor whose harrowing story of survival brought life to an event the world can never forget.

John Franken is a Jewish Canadian who was born in Semarang, Indonesia in 1922 and was conscripted to the Dutch Navy at the age of 18. Mr. Franken was on his way to Australia to complete his training as an aircraft mechanic when he was captured by Japanese soldiers. After nearly a year of slave labour, he was sent to Japan

to work first in a shipyard, then in a coal mine in Nagasaki. Three years after his arrival, the atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki, destroying the shipyard where Mr. Franken had worked and leaving terror in its wake. That day, which was so tragic for so many innocent people, was also the day that John Franken was set free, having survived the unimaginable because he was deep underground when the bomb was dropped.

John Franken has spent the last 50 years campaigning for an official apology from the Japanese government for the time he and many like him spent as POWs in Japanese slave labour camps during the Second World War. In 2003, the CBC aired a documentary entitled "Tea at the Embassy", which chronicles his tireless efforts, including a yearly pilgrimage from his home in Montreal to the Japanese Embassy in Ottawa. In addition, John Franken has shared his story with the Memory Project, a print and Internet initiative of the Dominion Institute to provide Canadians, especially youth, with a venue to share oral histories. Through this project, he has been invited to speak to many schoolchildren, including our students here at Centennial, about his experiences in the Second World War. Let us never forget.

Beyond Monet

Six Centennial Academy faculty members are participating in a three-year, province-wide study on "instructional intelligence." Angela Burgos, Julie Boudreau (Science), Don Clark (Mathematics), Sarah Cummings (Art), Ray Lawson (English) and Jean Fillatre attended the first training session in August with teacher and author, Barrie Bennett. Mr. Bennett's latest publication, *Beyond Monet (The Artful Science of Instructional Integration)* is the basis of the training for Centennial's team. They will meet with other educators from across the province over the course of the project and measure teacher

progress in the use of instructional design: skills, strategies, concepts, tactics and organizers.

The Centennial team makes an effort to meet once a month as a group to discuss progress on such topics as concept attainment and questioning techniques.

International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme

In December, Centennial's Middle Years Program (MYP) Steering Committee welcomed Hélène Sirois and Lisa McNutt, consultants appointed by the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO).

Over the course of the day Centennial grade 7 teachers and administrators shared the School's progress since becoming a candidate school in August 2004.

Both consultants were pleased with

the dedication, work completed and the willingness to learn expressed by the Centennial staff and faculty. Well over half our subject area teachers have received Level 1 and/or Level 2 teacher training from the IBO organization since March 2003. Teachers are now preparing for the next stage of the application process, which involves mapping the curriculum, planning lessons and unit plans, sharing MYP knowledge with the school community and visiting MYP schools in the Montreal area.

The purpose of the two-hour session was to provide essential information about the CEGEP application process, services that are available at CEGEP for students with learning needs, the mystery of "R-scores" and their importance in university admission, and strategies for making a successful transition from high school to college.

Angela Burgos introduced the main speakers, who included Alice Havel (Dawson Centre for Students with Learning Disabilities), Katherine Mayhew (McGill Senior Admissions Officer), John McMahon (Centennial College), Karla Gruodis (Centennial

Academic Advisor) and four recent CA grads who gave colorful accounts of their current experiences at Dawson, Marianopolis and Centennial colleges. 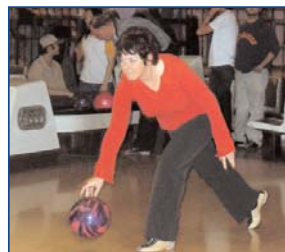

Michele Turner Off on her Next Adventure



Michele Turner began teaching at Centennial College in September of 1980. She had just recently returned from a year in China, after having put herself through a Masters in Philosophy. She was already an accomplished photographer, world traveler and adventure-seeker with a

contagious zeal for life. Her new colleagues quickly became her friends, and her students soon recognized her great gift for and love of teaching.

For 25 years, Ms. Turner has continued to inspire her students to ask questions, challenge themselves, and achieve more than they ever believed they could. This past semester, students in her Biomedical Ethics class began a discussion about panhandling and the homeless. As they debated the issues, Ms. Turner threw out a challenge: if students wanted to know what it was really like to be destitute, they should try it for a while. Lara Cernovitch and Mariana Maletskas answered the call, and spent their lunch break begging for money on Peel St. In just one hour, both girls experienced a wide-range of emotions and gained insight they won't soon forget.

That's a classic Ms. Turner: there's no reason to sit around asking questions

when you can get out there and find out for yourself.

Ms. Marion Clément, who has taught English at the College since 1990, recently paid tribute to her friend Michele at a special staff dinner, describing her as an unfailingly positive woman, who never shies away from a challenge and meets each of them with an elegant smile. "I could go on with her list of accomplishments but it wouldn't do justice to the person," she said. "In fact, you might think that someone who is so talented might be a bit overwhelming and even insufferable. But that is not Michele."

Though she will be taking a break from teaching, Ms. Turner has never stopped learning. She has already signed up for courses at Concordia, and may even take up Arabic in her spare time. "There is no can't or impossible in her vocabulary," Ms. Clément reminded us, "but the amazing thing I've learned from her is that

she is right. Because when you embrace possibility, as Michele has done, you end up with an amazing and exciting life." As we bid her farewell, those of us who had the privilege of knowing her even a little know for certain that her life, and the lives of the students she taught, will continue to be filled with adventure and challenge. We will hold her to her promise to visit often and continue to share her exciting stories with us.

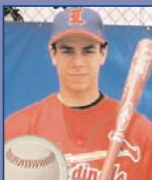
